## 1. GENERAL UPDATES

#### 1.1 Social Science and Humanities Eat and Greet

The Eat and Greet was a huge success! The Faculty of Social Science and Humanities (FSSH) Experiential Learning office, with Ontario Tech collaborators, hosted an Eat and Greet event featuring alumni and current students of Practicuum. 9 FSSH alumni shared their journey from Ontario Tech including self-care, determination, and community involvement in the sector. There were easily 100 people including students, faculty, staff, community members, and high school and college students considering a FSSH degree.

#### 1.4 OUSA Partners in Higher Education Dinner

Ontario Undergraduate Student Alliance Award for Teaching Excellence recognizes instructors who excel at unlocking the potential of Ontario's students. This is an opportunity to thank and provide an instructor with the recognition they deserve for successfully facilitating their students' desire to learn.

When you scroll through OUSA's list of Award Winners from all membership schools you may notice that we have 2 awards. Given that we have a North and Downtown campuses, part of the executive team's goals this year was to reflect both campuses at the Student Union and students who nominate their instructors at both campuses.

Since this is the OTSU's first year as a voting member of OUSA this is the first year we have been able to celebrate instructors at PiHED. The nominations were reviewed by OTSU's Student Advocacy and Advisory Committee (SAAC), proposed to the Board of Directors where the final nomination was ratified. 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# 1.7 Communities with Brooms

We joined the City of Oshawa with M.P. Colin Carrie, John Howard Society, and the Durham Regional Police, Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities for this annual initiative. We cleaned up downtown Oshawa's streets, foster community pride, build partnerships and raise awareness regarding clean and safe communities.

We met at North Parkette of City Hall to collect a map, garbage bags, gloves. Post event there was a BBQ at M.P. Colin Carrie's office.

## 1.8 Queen's Park Bill 166 An Act to amend the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities Act

Bill 166 "amends the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities Act with respect to colleges of applied arts and technology and publicly-assisted universities. The amendments include the following:

- Every college and university is required to have a student mental health policy that describes the programs, policies, services and supports available at the college or university in respect of student mental health.
- Every college and university is required to have policies and rules to address and combat racism and hate, including but not limited to anti-Indigenous racism, anti-Black racism, antisemitism and Islamophobia.
- The Minister is authorized to issue directives in relation to the information to be provided about the costs as-

sociated with attendance at the college or university".

The recommendations and speaking notes from Angelique and I that we highlighted at the delegation at Queen's Park will be on the OTSU's Latest. Our recommendations were as follows:

- Under Student Mental Health Policy, including the addition of "a description of the student input process" to align with the verbiage of Regulation 131/16 of the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities Act.
- Expand the understanding of Student Mental Health Services to include supports such as but not limited to Indigenous Centre, DEI Offices, and student-facing departments to allow for additional support for these services.
- In agreement with our provincial advocacy body, the Ontario Undergraduate Student Alliance, the OTSU
  recommends that "A new clause should be added such that a provincial advisory committee be struck and
  comprised of racialized and religious students, faculty, staff, administrators, and community leaders. This
  committee will be responsible for helping create and advise on the policies being developed at post-secondary
  institutions."
- The OTSU notes that the Ministry of Colleges and Universities should mandate that all institution-based mental health care providers receive training on providing accessible, trauma-informed, and culturally relevant counselling and referrals to diverse populations."

The Critic of Colleges and Universities MPP Peggy Salter and other members of the committees asked us questions based on our delegations as well.

## 1. GENERAL UPDATES

#### 1.1 Meeting with 75% of Students, Faculty and Staff before December 1, 2023

The ambitious goal was 1741 downtown stakeholders before the end of the first semester, unfortunately, I was not able to reach this however, I was able to get this number up to 1,452. Originally my focus was on students, faculty and staff but with the opportunities from the community & OUSA, this has expanded to community members such as the GAP Committee (community partners working towards ending homelessness in Durham Region), the Transit

Executive Committee members, municipal and provincial politicians, student leaders from across Ontario (some of which share advice of unique challenges of satellite campuses) and international partners (such as the International Town and Gown Committee). I have not included these partners in my number as they were not originally accounted for, however, if included would bring my total much above the original goal.

This success is in large part due to OUSA and the opportunities this membership has brought to our team for collaboration, partnership and expansion of our services. For example, during Fall General Assembly I was able to advocate for a PCR set specifically targeted on satellite campuses which allowed for the Downtown perspective to be heard.

#### 1.2 Downtown Residence Focus Group

The attendance for this focus group was small however it opened room for collaboration with 1SIXTY1, now known as Alma. Sam, incoming VP Downtown Mati and myself were able to tour the building and get more details around the amenities offered. The goal is to create an inviting space for students alongside the committee with common spaces, shared amenities and community engagement opportunities.

## 1.3 Alumni Engagement Strategic Planning Stakeholder Consultation Session

The OTSU doesn't work much with Alumni engagement as they aren't typically part of our target demographic however the team was invited to sit in on this stakeholder consultation session as to give our experience and expertise in the space. I attended to represent the OTSU as a recent Alumni myself. It was great conversations around "what does it mean to be an Ontario Tech Student/Alumni"? And how to continue to offer opportunities to engage graduates years down the road.

## 1.4 Pints & Politics

Second year our team has put together this event and it was a success! We invited back MPP French and MPP McCarthy alongside Councillor Jim Lee, OUSA Executive Director Malika and OTSU Alumni Josh. There was a great turnout of students alongside meaningful discussions around municipal and provincial affairs. I look forward to seeing this tradition continue and expand in attendance. This past week, a City Councillor had mentioned a desire to attend in 2025; I have prepared a transition document specific to this event so we can carry on with the wishes of our esteemed guests.

#### 1.5 SCSP Bill 166 Legislative Assembly

Sam and I had the opportunity to speak in front of the Standing Committee for Social Policy on Bill 166 Strengthening Accountability and Student Supports Act. This was an opportunity brought forth through our membership with

OUSA and we presented alongside five other partnered institutions over the span of two days. It was another great opportunity for Sam and I to represent the priorities of our students; I specifically highlighted the need for clear communication of the student input process on institution mental health policy as well as expansion of the definition of student mental health services to include those historically excluded such as Indigenous Centres, Equity departments and so forth. ## 1.6 Habitat Paper

Over this past month I have been working alongside Sam to bring forward an addition to the OUSA annual Habitat paper. This publication focuses on the municipal conversations around housing and students perspectives/recommendations.

The OTSU alongside other members of the Ontario Tech and Oshawa community got together on April 23rd for the annual Communities with Brooms! It was a great opportunity to meet more stakeholders in the community and find ways of collaboration in the future. Special thanks to FSSH and Campus Sustainability for promoting and encouraging students to be involved.

## 1.8 Downtown Campus Advisory Committee (DCAC) Annual Report

In accordance with the DCAC's terms of reference, the committee must publish an annual report. This year, the DCAC took a more advisory approach, with the hope of setting up the next committee for success by offering recommendations to hit the ground running; therefore this report will be centred around improvements for the next term.

## 1.9 OUSA Partners in Higher Education (PiHED) Dinner

On April 10th, I had the pleasure of joining my fellow executives, Brian Robson, Dan Walters, Dr. Mary Bluechardt, Dr. Syed Qadri, and Arajenthira Narenthira at a Partners in Higher Education Dinner. It was a great opportunity to see such deserving recipients, Dan and Dr. Qadri receive the award for Teach Excellence. This award recognizes

Instructors whose commitment to supporting students goes above-and-beyond, and ensures students are getting a high quality of education at Ontario Tech.

# 1.10 OTHS Update

Out of the 14 mandates set by the board in August of last year, 10 have been completed with the remaining recommendations being: OTHS proposing space rental funding allocation 2024/25 AGM, co-designing elections strategy, revision of Society Election policy, and key agreement for the OTHS office.

#### 1.11 Transition

I have connected with Mati, incoming VP Downtown, over the last week and finding space for her to meet with key downtown stakeholders to continue momentum on legacy priorities. She has had the opportunity to meet with Dr. Steven Murphy, Dr. Lori Livingston, Dr. Mary Bluechardt, Dan Walters, Jennifer Robb, Campus Sustainability and Brilliant Catalyst. Additionally, Mati and I filmed a final Downtown Deets where it is handed off to her to continue 2021-2023 VP Downtown Dakoda Cluett's legacy.

We touched on her key priorities for the upcoming year and I am excited to see the impact she will be able to make on the Downtown community.
