# PRESIDENT, RAI ALI

#### **GENERAL UPDATES**

#### Orientation and Glo-Week

I assisted the Events & Engagement Coordinator with the Glo-Week events by helping with setup and providing support during the activities. This occupied most of the month, as there was an event every working day during the first two weeks of September.

## • Club and Societies Week

## Executive Job Descriptions

I presented a proposed amendment to the OTSU Bylaws to the Policy Committee, which they approved. The amendment aims to:

- **Remove detailed job descriptions** for executive positions from the bylaws (Sections 12.4 to 12.7.9), allowing for greater flexibility in adapting roles as needs change.
- Update executive titles to better reflect our current strategic direction:
- President
- Vice President of Student Services
- Vice President of University Affairs
- Vice President of External Affairs

The detailed job descriptions will be maintained in internal policy documents, which can be updated as required without needing bylaw amendments.

I then met with the HR Committee to finalize the job descriptions for the new Vice President roles. The new job descriptions are ready, and I will present them to the board during this meeting.

I have also submitted a proposal for the Annual General Meeting to amend the bylaws as recommended by the Policy Committee. If approved by the board, the proposal will be presented at the AGM for final approval by the students.

#### Orientation

This month I participated in our Orientation events and just got to engage with students. I also got the opportunity to hear their feedback during the events.

#### Durham Region Transport Advocacy (DRT)

Actively working with Kamika (DRT Ambassador) to figure out a day where she can table on behalf of DRT to answer any of the students' questions.

Stephen Thickett provided an update on specialized drop-off services. He mentioned that depending on the reservationist, driver, and number of passengers, drop-off locations can vary. He did bring up the fact that the university has an expanded footprint since these services were implemented and he was able to propose two key requests: first, that passengers be dropped off at a specific address on campus when accessible, and second, the designation of an additional drop-off location at 40 Founders Drive, situated between Shawenjigewining Hall and the Library. I am waiting to hear back if DRT followed up with any questions. In the meantime, students were encouraged to input the specific address for their desired drop-off location (this does not guarantee that they will be able to be dropped off).

This month I was not able to meet up with Trent university as we had hoped due to conflict in our schedules due to Orientation events.

#### OUSA

OUSA is working on changing some bylaws. These potential new bylaws do not contradict our union's bylaws. They outline the policy regarding who will be eligible to represent the Student Union at OUSA.

This month I also worked on coordinating the OUSA HO staff visit. OUSA home office staff is set to visit our campus on October 10th where they'll have the opportunity to meet some of our school senior leadership as well as our full time staff. They will also be tabling so students will also have an opportunity to ask questions. An instagram reel to promote this will be going up sometime in the first week of October as well as give opportunity to students to ask their questions virtually (comment section of the reel). Sophia (Indigenization Strategy Intern at OUSA) is also visiting our campus early October for consultations and focus groups with students.

This month I also prepared for the Fall general assembly (GA). Delegates for this year's GA are our execs and president. I've also edited the Blue Ribbon Panel paper which is going to be presented in the upcoming GA.
